Dr. Yoost pursued a career in Obstetrics and Gynecology because she enjoyed women's health issues, and it was during her residency that she found herself drawn to taking care of younger patients. After residency, she completed a Fellowship in Pediatric and Adolescent Gynecology (PAG) at Kosair Children's Hospital. This is one of only seven PAG Fellowship programs in the nation, specializing in gynecologic care for females under the age of 18. She currently serves as the Pediatric and Adolescent Gynecologist in an academic practice at Marshall University and sees patients daily under the age of 18 for gynecologic care. She has expertise in providing contraceptive counseling and services to younger patients, including the use of long acting reversible contraceptives, which have been shown to be safe and effective in teenagers.
